SUMMER TRANSITIONS CAMPS: BUILDING SKILLS & TEAMWORK



SAIL's Transitions Camps combined outdoor exploration with life-skills building and teamwork exercises.

Participants learned meal-planning, kayaking and camp cooking techniques while exploring and having fun.

This summer SAIL proudly hosted three engaging Transitions Camps for middle and high school students in Iuneau, Haines, and Sitka. partnership with the State of Alaska's Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR), these camps were designed to foster essential life skills, promote teamwork, and inspire future career goals through hands-on activities for youth who experience a range of disabilities. In Juneau and Haines, students received a stipend recognition of their hard work and full participation. The stipend helped SAIL recruit students who otherwise may have been reluctant to participate, and created a financial incentive to stick with the program through challenges.

Juneau: Navigating Futures and Building Skills: Our Juneau camp focused on future career goals and soft skill development. The camp began with an exhilarating day at the SAIL Challenge Course, where participants engaged in goal-setting and self-discovery through structured debriefs. Over the next two days, students delved into kayak safety protocols and paddling exercises, followed by a discussion on healthy foods and a visit to Fred Meyer to independently purchase supplies for their capstone picnic on the last day of camp. Our dedicated team, equipped with certifications ranging from NOLS Wilderness First Responder to American Canoe Association Level 2, ensured a high-quality experience. The camp culminated with a challenging trip to Suedla Island, requiring students to utilize teamwork, collaboration, and healthy communication to reach their destination.

Sitka: Kayaking Adventures and Team Building: In Sitka, our four-day kayak camp offered a unique blend of adventure and skill-building. Students embarked on a kayaking journey that included learning essential kayak skills, water safety, and ocean kayaking techniques. The highlight was a kayaking trip to Samsing Cabin, where participants engaged in team-building activities, cooked dinner, and spent the night in the cabin. This immersive experience taught practical skills and fostered collaboration and resilience in a stunning setting.

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PROTECTING YOUNG MINDS: HELMET DISTRIBUTION AND TRAUMATIC BRAIN INJURY AWARENESS

We're thrilled to share the success of our recent effort to protect local youth by distributing helmets and raising awareness about traumatic and acquired brain injuries (TABI) across communities.

Traumatic brain injuries pose significant risks, particularly for youth who are active and engaging in sports or recreational activities. Statistics highlight the severity of this issue: according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), approximately 3.5 million children and adolescents in the United States experience TABIs each year. Among these, falls, sports-related injuries, and vehicle accidents are leading causes.

Notably, children aged 0-14 experience the highest rates of brain injury-related emergency room visits, underscoring the urgent need for preventive measures such as helmet use. These injuries can have profound and lasting effects, including cognitive impairments, behavioral changes, and in severe cases, long-term disability. Protecting young individuals with appropriate safety gear is crucial to reducing the incidence and impact of traumatic brain injuries.

Thanks to an additional grant and partnerships with local organizations and schools, SAIL's TABI Program was able to expand our reach and impact with key events aimed at promoting traumatic brain injury awareness. This included distributing more than 550 helmets in Juneau, Kake, Angoon, and Skagway. Each event provided children a helmet to decorate, with alongside educational materials and conversations about the importance of helmet use and the TABI Program.

The response from our communities has been overwhelmingly positive. Not only were hundreds of Southeast youth equipped with protective equipment, they also engaged in creative activities that highlighted the importance of safety. The decorated helmets were a hit, with kids proudly displaying understanding of how helmets can protect

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TRANSITION TO SUCCESS: FROM HIGH SCHOOL TO HIRED

He engaged in stocking, shelving, and inventory duties, and gained hands-on experience with machinery for product movement.

Following high school graduation, Cody continued his work experience at AC Lakeside, proving to be a valuable addition to the team. Cody says he appreciates the organization and cleanliness aspects of his work. In recognition of his hard work and good fit on the team, he received a permanent job offer. Congratulations, Cody!

Haines: Flexibility and Community Exploration

Haines presented a different kind of opportunity with camps focused on flexibility and patience. Due to unpredictable weather and the arrival of new students, the schedule was adapted to provide a comprehensive view of the Haines community. Students visited local businesses and organizations, including the Southeast Alaska Fairgrounds, Haines Rescue Kennel, and the local library. They also participated in a financial literacy workshop at Tongass Federal Credit Union.

Each camp provided a unique opportunity for students to develop essential life skills, explore potential career paths, and enhance their ability to work effectively as a team. We are excited to see the positive impacts of these experiences on the participants as they return to school and prepare for their futures this fall. SUMMER WORK COMBINES ACCOMPLISHMENT AND ADVENTURE
